## Sailor Success Program and Schedule- 6th Grade ONLY

## POSITIVITY PROJECT FAMILY INFORMATION

"I can sum up positive psychology in just three words—other people matter. Period. Anything that builds relationships between and among people is going to make you happy." -Dr. Chris Peterson

#### What is The Positivity Project?

The Positivity Project (P2) is dedicated to empowering America's youth to build positive relationships by recognizing the character strengths in themselves and others. Their vision is to help schools and families cultivate citizens and leaders who will enhance our communities and country. Positive psychology's scientifically validated 24 character strengths serve as its foundation. Positive psychology teaches that people have all 24 strengths within them – and that character is not just skills or behaviors, but rather an intrinsic part of each of us.

P2 is not a program with strict guidelines. Instead, it educates teachers on the character strengths and relies on them to teach in a way that best meets their students' needs. It is a school-wide endeavor, grounded in the consistency of daily classroom instruction. Their model is holistic; it incorporates students, educators, and parents through regular interaction with character strengths vocabulary and concepts.

The project will help educators instill vocabulary and the meaning of the strengths through explicit teaching of each strength for 15 minutes per day. Schools will dedicate one week to each strength to help students understand them through definition, examples, discussions, and exercises. Schools and educators are encouraged to tailor the materials for their own best use, as they know their students and curriculum better than anyone else.

#### What are the benefits of implementing The Positivity Project?

P2 ideals evolve throughout a student's whole school career. The 24 character strengths develop and gain more meaning for students as they grow. Once students learn the meaning of each strength and what it looks like, they can then be embedded into the curriculum in every subject area. The character strengths become a part of a common vocabulary and they will see them in everything that they do.

P2 empowers students by acknowledging that the 24 character strengths are already a part of who they are as people. It helps them to realize that each and every one of them have these strengths. There is no system in place to reward students who demonstrate "Good Character". Rewards are fun to earn but they are finite because they are external. We want children to internalize the traits that society honors. Acknowledgement to oneself and realizing that you have the power to affect others in a positive way is much more meaningful and rewarding.

Positive character strengths can and should be acknowledged in the classroom, as it gives students a richer understanding of what the character strength looks like in their peer group. Students understand that they have their own "Super Power" and they will be acknowledged and valued for their own character strengths.

#### How can you help?

We would love for you to take an active role in your child's character strength education. By using the character strengths vocabulary and having discussions about the concepts, you will help your child understand the character in themselves and others in a different light. # Scheduling



## Scheduling

As you can imagine scheduling six different classes for over 700 students represents a challenge. We are pleased to report that a vast majority of our students were able get courses that they chose during enrollment in the spring of last year. **Some courses that your son/daughter may have selected will appear on their schedule for the 2<sup>nd</sup> semester.** The process used to schedule our students begins with their request forms in the spring. From that information, our district establishes staffing to fulfill the needs of our schools. This staffing may involve teachers moving to another school within the district, or in extreme circumstances, reducing a teacher to part-time, or even laid off. Therefore, our ability function as a school and a district must have certain guidelines to follow for scheduling. While we make every effort to satisfy the needs of our students, schedule changes are at times difficult to make, and in some cases, not possible. **FINAL SCHEDULES ARE NOT COMPLETE.** 

Changes in scheduling for our Honors Program are even more difficult. Our Honors Program has strict guidelines for entrance into the program and continued enrollment once in. We believe that potential Honors students should have multiple measures to ensure fairness in the selection process. The guidelines are outlined below:

## To request Honors class- Student must meet ALL four requirements

**Grade Requirement –** at least an A- or higher in Regular class or B- or higher in Honors class **Standardized and District testing requirement-** High score in M-Step and NWEA testing **Teacher recommendation**- Subject area teacher recommends Honors

Students who request Honors and meet the guidelines listed above are placed on a list for approval. Once the list is finalized, sections for the course are set and teacher staffing is placed. This occurs at the end of each school year. After this process is concluded, there can be no additions.

Once in an Honors course, students must maintain the following guidelines to remain enrolled in the class: Students must have and maintain a B+ or better within ALL grade categories (i.e. Assessments, Homework, Participation, etc.) within each Honors course. The student's grades will be evaluated at the following intervals:

First quarter Progress Report End of the First Quarter Second quarter Progress Report End of the Second Quarter Third quarter Progress Report End of the Third Quarter Fourth quarter Progress Report End of the Fourth Quarter 1st Semester Grade 2nd Semester Grade

If a student falls below the grade requirements, he or she will be placed on Academic Honors Probation for the remainder of the year in that honors course(s). The student has until the next grade evaluation to raise and maintain his or her grade to a B- (80% or better) within ALL grade categories. If the student does not maintain the required average, he or she will be removed from that particular Honors course(s) and placed into the regular curriculum. I hope this information is useful and gives you a better understanding our scheduling process.

# ATHLETICS

## Anchor Bay Middle School North Eligibility Requirements

Anchor Bay Middle School North prides itself on having the best students in the state of Michigan! Athletics is an extension of our wonderful school. North athletes are not only very coachable, respectful, and good sports; they understand the importance of academics. Our student athletes are held to a high standard on the playing fields and courts, but in the classroom as well! Every North athlete must meet the athletic department eligibility rules. They are as follows:

- 1. All athletes must be passing all of their classes.
- 2. Student grades are checked every two weeks during the fall, winter, and spring seasons.
- 3. Thursday morning of an eligibility week, grades will be checked by 9:00 A.M. Students that are identified with failing grades will meet with Mr. Ledbetter to discuss strategies to improve. The student will have until the following Monday to meet with their teacher to discuss how to improve the failing grade. If by the following Monday, the grade has not improved, the student athlete will be INELIGIBLE until the grade is above passing.
- 4. If a player is deemed ineligible- the athlete, parents, and coaches are notified by:
  - a. A hand-written letter will be given to the student athlete.
  - b. The coach will receive an email from the athletic secretary.
  - c. An email will be sent to the parents of the ineligible students.
- 5. Mr. Ledbetter and Mrs. Binge will closely monitor any ineligible students. This creates an opportunity for positive discussion about how to be a successful student and how it translates to the athletic world. These requirements are not for punishment, they are to teach about building responsibility and character.

## **Reward Trips**

Reward trips are part of our Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program. They are designed to encourage positive behavior and academic success. The following trips are planned for the 2023-24 school year for students who meet the qualifying standards.

To qualify for our PBIS Reward Trips, students must meet the criteria established in our student code of conduct.

"A student receiving a total of six (6) demerit points will be excluded from the school trip program. Any student involved in a fight, instigating a fight or referred for a major infraction of a violent nature will be excluded from the school trip program. "

Qualifying for these trips is a reward to our students for meeting a high standard. NO EXCEPTIONS TO THE POINT TOTAL PROGRAM WILL BE ALLOWED. The Washington DC Trip has additional Demerit requirements due to the length of the trip and being an out-of-state overnight trip. Specific information will be given to participants when registered.

# Attendance Policies



Regular attendance in school is an essential part of students academic success. Michigan law requires that whoever has custody or charge of any child between ages 6 and 18 shall assure that the child attends public school during the entire school year. Michigan law requires that the student's attendance be <u>continuous and consecutive</u> for the school year fixed by the school district.

**Truancy-**When it appears that absences are excessive (normally 10 days for the school year) without acceptable reason, the Macomb county Attendance Officer and the Probate Court system is automatically notified.

**ABSENCES-** For every absence, the student's parent or guardian must present information to the school explaining the reason for the absence. We prefer this information to be called into the school office by 10:00 a.m., the day of the absence. If this is inconvenient, a note signed by the parent or guardian must be presented to the office on the day of the student's return. Absences, which are not explained by parents within 24 hours, are unexcused. Acceptable reasons for absences:

- 1. Medical Reasons Excessive absences require a doctor's note
- 2. Bereavement to attend a funeral
- 3. Family Vacation or Religious Retreat

If an absence is school related, it will not count against the student, ie: field trip, award presentation, etc.

### UNEXCUSED ABSENCES

If parents have not called in and students have failed to bring in a note, they will be considered unexcused.

## REQUEST FOR LEAVE OF ABSENCE

If parents find it necessary to take students out of school for an extended period, a Request for a Leave of Absence form should be obtained from the office. The form should be properly completed by the parent and teachers at least two (2) days before the leave is to begin. Homework is expected to be completed upon return.

## MAKE-UP WORK

Students are allowed one (1) day for every day absent in order to make up their work. Students have the responsibility of asking the teacher for their work when they return to school. To receive passing grades, all work needs to be complete. Long term assignments/projects will be due upon the students return.

# **Homework Policy**



## Make-up work

Students are allowed one (1) day for every day absent in order to make up their work. Students have the responsibility of asking the teacher for their work when they return to school. To receive passing grades, all work needs to be complete. Long term assignments/projects will be due upon the students return.

## Absence and homework requests

Our code of conduct states that students who are absent 3 consecutive days or less will obtain missed assignments from their teachers **<u>upon returning</u> <u>to school</u>**.

For students that will be absent 4 or more consecutive days <u>a request can</u> <u>be made prior to leaving</u> for homework. Work can be picked up 24 hours after the request is made.

Please remember work that is requested before an extended absence is **due the day the student returns to school**.

If requested work is not turned in the day the student returns our "Homework Policy" will apply. Our homework policy states that students will have 5 days to submit work after the due date, however credit for late work will be reduced by 10% for each day late. Ex. 1 day late 10% reduction- 2 days late 20% reduction etc.

## **Retake/Test Correction Policy**

## Who is eligible to make test corrections?

•<u>All students</u> are eligible to retake or make test corrections to earn a half point back for each point lost on the original assessment.

## When will test corrections/retakes be done?

- •The teacher and student will decide on the appropriate time for the Retake/Test correction.
- •Retakes can be done during the school day in the MTSS room. If arrangements can't be made during the school day it must be done after school within the Testing Center or during Seminar period. The Testing center is open Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday in the Media Center from 3pm to 4pm.
- •The test redo/retake must be done within one week of the returning of the assessment. If a student fails to show up at the agreed upon time, the option of retake or redo is forfeited.

## What must be done prior to retest/redo?

•Requirements that students must do before a retake/test correction are determined independently by individual classroom procedures.

## **Academic Integrity Policy**

Academic Integrity-Academic integrity is a critical part of providing a first-class education to our NORTH students. It also becomes of more significance as students continue into high school and college. Therefore, it is important to educate our students about what academic integrity is and the prominence it carries in education. Academic integrity in its simplest form is producing, creating, and submitting work under one's own merit. When a student does not follow that basic principle of academic integrity, it is called academic dishonesty. Academic dishonesty can take place in many shapes or forms. The examples of academic dishonesty include, but are not limited to:

· Copying work from students or allowing another student to copy your work.

· Looking at a student's test or quiz or allowing someone to look at your test or quiz.

· Sending, receiving, or using information or any electronic device, such as a computer, cell phone, **social media**, graphing calculator or programmable watch, during a test or quiz.

· Possession or use of unauthorized materials obtained from any source, including notes written on body parts or clothing during a test/quiz.

· Communicating during a test by talking, signaling, and/or passing information.

· Changing an answer after work has been graded, then presenting it as improperly graded.

· Sharing answers on a take-home exam, or asking or allowing another student to take an examination for you.

· Obtaining a test, quiz, or answer key before the test without the teacher's permission or providing information about a quiz or test with students who have not taken it yet.

· Copying or circulating previously given tests/quizzes, that are to be returned to the teacher at the conclusion of the examination for use by other students.

· Using text or other ideas from an encyclopedia, book, textbook, website, database, or any other source as your own without proper citation.

· Submitting work that another person did and taking credit for it

· Creating false information, data, and/or citations.

According to our Student Code of Conduct Handbook, "Cheating, copying assignments or tests, giving an assessment or test to another student to copy (no credit for assignments/tests)" is a violation that includes a consequence.

Consequences that will be used are at the discretion of the teacher and administrator in whole or in part. **First Offense** -A zero on the assignment (assignment cannot be made up for credit), Parent Notification and a referral to the office. Disciplinary consequences MAY be included. **Second Offense**- A zero on the assignment (assignment cannot be made up for credit) and Parent Notification and a Referral to the office. Disciplinary consequences WILL be included in accordance with our Student Code of Conduct and may include a possible revoked membership in National Junior Honor Society and/or Student Council. **Subsequent violations-**Anchor Bay MS North administration may use discretion when issuing additional consequences.

## **Medication Policy**



## Dear parents-

In case you are unfamiliar with the school's policy on the administration of medication to students by school personnel, we would like to bring you up to date on this matter. If your child must have medication of any type during school hours, including over the counter drugs, you have the following choices:

#1. You may come to school and give the medication to your child at the appropriate time

#2. You may arrange for medication to be dispensed by staff. Obtain a copy of a medical form from the school office. Take the form to your child's doctor and have him/her complete the form by listing the medication needed, doses, and number of times per day it is to be administrated. This form must be completed by the physician for both prescriptions and over the counter drugs. Prescription medications must be brought to school in a pharmacy labeled bottle. Over the counter drugs must be received in the original container. Both must be labeled with instructions on how and when the medication is to be given and labeled with your child's name. The over the counter medication will be administrated according to the doctor's written instructions.

#3. You may discuss with your child's doctor an alternative schedule for administrating medications (ie. outside of school hours).

#4. Diabetic students: The school staff will follow the Michigan State Board of Education plan for "Care of Diabetic Students at School" policy. Contact the school office for development of your child's individual health plan.

#5. Some students may need to self-medicate for certain chronic health conditions. Students who need to self-medicate with a prescription drugs (ie. Inhaler, EpiPen, oral prescriptions, etc) must have a self-medication authorization form on file at school which includes the physician and parent / legal guardian signatures. Forms are available from the school office

At the conclusion of the students treatment, the unused medication must be removed from the school by the parent. Any medication not picked up by the last day of school will be disposed of properly.

\*\*Please note School personnel will not administer any medication to students unless they have received medication form properly completed and signed by the doctor; and the medication has been received in an appropriate labeled container. and fairness to those giving the medication and to protect the safety of your child, there will be no exceptions to this policy. if you have any questions about this policy, or other issues related to the administration of medication in schools please contact the principal thank you for your cooperation\*\*
